



We have been learning

<p>Africa (Year R)</p>	<p>What an amazing final week we have had in Africa class! We have been super busy writing about our trip to Horsham Museum, writing sentences about what we saw and what our favourite exhibits were. The coach and packed lunches were very popular! In phonics, we practised recognising red words in a fun game of red word bingo. In PSED, we have been thinking about different kinds of emotions, linking it with The Zones of Regulation framework. We have continued to consolidate our knowledge of subtraction in maths and enjoyed a visit from a baby bluetit that was found in the ceiling! Enjoy a great half term, Africa class. See you soon!</p>
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Asia (Year 1)	Wow what another busy half term! I cannot believe we have only got one half term left. We have continued our learning of arrays in maths and are recognising the columns and rows in these, and have realised that we can make it into a times table and a repeated addition number sentence. In English, we have continued our writing of meerkat information pages and they are absolutely amazing, all the children have produced beautiful work. In geography, we have been learning about maps and drew a map of the school, which was very exciting. In French with Miss Kent, we had to work as a team to build a tower out of marshmallows and spaghetti, this was good fun. We practised playing our recorders in music and were repeating back rhythms Mrs Eames played. Finally in RSHE, we were comparing ourselves from when we were a baby to now, how we have changed and the things we can do now as a child compared to when we were a baby. I hope you all have a lovely and restful half term and cannot wait to see you all in your red, white and blue on Monday for the Jubilee party.
Europe (Year 2)	We have had a full on week, even though it has only been 4 days and I know the children are ready for half term. We have been busy doing final edits and publishing our pirate stories into books this week in English. To make our maps look authentic, we used coffee to stain them and make them feel old. They will be added to our books at the beginning to excite and entice the reader. We have worked really hard to show Mrs Hutchings what we can do independently this week, with a focus on reading, maths and spelling. We have done her proud and were really sensible. BUT the most fabulous day of the week was our offsite visit to Brighton Sealife Centre! We had such a incredible day and loved seeing so many amazing ocean and sea creatures up close. Australasia (Year 3)	In Maths this week, we developed our skills on how to tell the time to 5 minute and 1 minute intervals. This proved quite tricky but we showed excellent perseverance. In Science, we learnt how water is transported in a plant and we have used all of our growing science knowledge to constantly improve and tend to our class garden. It is beginning to look beautiful! In Literacy, our book 'An Interview with a Tiger' continues to make us laugh and we are using this writing style to work on our own version of a book 'An interview with a worm and other garden creatures.' In ICT, we are making stop frame animation using iMotion and in Music our recorder playing is coming along nicely. What a busy half term it has been. Enjoy the half term break!
Antarctica (Year 4)	Although it has been a short week, we have still packed a lot in! Our class had the opportunity to play the samba drums, courtesy of Daniel Gilmore of the West Sussex Music Service. It felt like a real band and we got the chance to try out different instruments that we had never even heard of! We made rainforest cookies based on foods from the rainforest and we also designed the packaging to transport the cookies. Our poems have been published-they are so descriptive and show off our writing skills. In Geography, we looked at the similarities and

	differences between the Amazon rainforest and Sherwood Forest in the U.K. We hope you all have a restful and fun half-term!
North America (Year 5)	The highlight of our week, this week, was when we were joined by music specialist, Daniel Gilmore. The children took part in a samba workshop. We created a cacophony of noise in the samba style and had an absolute blast. A lovely way to finish the half term.
