Spring Week 3

Dear Parents and Carers,

I am sure you are aware of a growing number of positive Covid cases within the school over the last couple of weeks. I have spoken with the UK Health Security Agency on a daily basis as well as contacting the local Public Health Team and Local Authority. I have ensured they have the latest, exact figures for the number of cases we have and taken advice accordingly. Advice includes not having to close classes whilst we are able to maintain the necessary staffing, which we have been able to do. We continue to work to our Outbreak Management Plan, maintaining class 'bubbles' throughout and avoiding large gatherings (lunches and assemblies) as well as continuing to encourage good hand hygiene, thorough cleaning and kept a well ventilated environment. We continue to follow the guidance on testing and self-isolation and I know you are all being as vigilant as possible yourselves. Even where numbers have risen in specific year groups (Year 2 and Year 6 currently have the highest number) we are told that members of the class are not necessarily considered 'close contacts'. It might be advisable, however, if you have children in these classes, for them to take daily LFD tests for the next 7 days. This is not mandatory and is just additional advice from UKHSA. We will continue to take the precautions necessary to keep children in school and safe.

In other news, we were lucky enough this week to have an author visit our KS2 classes. David Fuller, author of the *Alfie Jones* series of books, as well as others, spent the day talking to the children about his life as an author and his journey as a writer. As someone who has mild dyspraxia and struggled with writing as a child, he had an inspirational message for the children about how to follow your dreams and never give up. He talked about the process he goes through when writing his books, read extracts from them (including a chapter when Alfie goes on a date – much to the Year 6 children's horror!) and gave advice about what it takes to be an effective writer. One of his main messages for being a successful writer was to be a reader! As far as David is concerned, the more reading the children do the better their imaginations, ideas and writing can become. He is a big fan of children getting ideas and inspiration from the authors they read. He even offered to critique some Year 3 writing if they wanted to send it to him (though one of the children in Year 3 asked *him* not to steal *their* ideas!). Thank you to Mrs Wilson for arranging this very memorable visit for the children.



As David told the children, reading is such an enjoyable thing to do and can give them new vocabulary, ideas and an opportunity to go anywhere they want. Therefore I am pleased that our development of the new library has continued this week as the IT suite is cleared in preparation for it.



Finally, Mrs. Hutchings had the privilege of taking a group of Year 5 & 6 children to attend an inter-schools Tag-Rugby session, on Wednesday. Having never experienced the game of rugby before, the group of 8 gave it their all, showed such resilience in the face of some very strong teams, and reflected on the positives of their experience. She was immensely proud to have had this group representing our school. Well done and thank you to Emily O, Emily P, Thomas W, Holly Ti, Elsie L, Alexa V-S & Alex and Ava. And thank you to Mrs Hutchings for accompanying them.

Congratulations to Albert, Harry L and Vienna, who all had their birthdays this week. Please do send a photo into the school office as we love to see how you celebrated at home.


This term's core value is **BELIEVE** and the wider values for the half term are **Resilience** and **Collaboration**.

We have been learning

Africa (Year R)	This week we have continued looking at the story of Goldilocks. We wrote apology letters on her behalf for her behaviour towards the Bears! Africa class impressed all the grown-ups with how well they used their phonic knowledge to write their sentences and how well they remembered to include finger spaces and a full stop. In maths, we have been learning about capacity and, in science, we have been leaning about making predictions during a floating and sinking experiment. In French this week, we continued our animal topic and learned how to say pig, cat and chicken. We also enjoyed singing songs in French. Although it was really cold, we still enjoyed woodland learning. We explored the area and observed what happens to the environment when it gets cold and frosty. Well done for yet another great week, Africa class!
Asia (Year 1)	What another brilliant week in Asia class! In English this week, we have continued to learn about our core text of 'Traction Man' and have made predictions about the story and have all completed some guided reading and have really noticed a difference! Well done Year 1! We are continuing with our phonics and they continually amaze me with their knowledge. In French with Madame Kent, we have been learning about our favourite animals. We have been mathematicians this week, and have been focusing on place value in numbers up to 20. We had a brilliant time in music where we continued to learn and play the ukulele. We had gymnastics with Mrs Davies and we were balancing and holding different shapes. We had another great session of Woodland Learning. In computing, we used Clicker 8 to write some sentences. Finally, we finished the week with looking at changing the shade of a colour in art and observing and describing the weather in Spring.

Europe (Year 2)	This week we have explored retelling a familiar story as part of our English sessions. We are drafting our first efforts and hope to publish these into our own little books. In maths, we have been working with arrays and continuing to learn to use the 2x, 5x and 10x tables. In science, we went out and about to find uses of materials in and around our school. In PE, we are doing amazing dance sequences and impressing Mrs. Hutchings with our pose and control. In computing, we used the ipads to learn to take photos. We had a challenge to complete from close up photos to selfies! In RE, we explored how music from different faiths made us feel and in DT we evaluated the products we made, thinking about our successes and ways to improve.
Australasia (Year 3)	In maths this week, we have been working hard on multiplication, following a series of steps to answer the questions accurately. We are getting quicker with our times table recall too! In Literacy, we have successfully completed our task to catch a dragon and have written our instructions clearly and concisely. On Monday, when we had the author, David Fuller, come to visit we asked sensible and thoughtful questions. He promised to read some of our dragon stories too – so we best get writing. In Science, we are learning about keeping our bodies healthy and we investigated the nutritional values of different snacks to work out which was the healthiest. We continue to enjoy our class book 'The Boy Who Grew Dragons' by Andy Sheperd, especially the bits that make us laugh out loud.
Antarctica (Year 4)	We have written lots in Antarctica class this week. We built tension in our writing using a variety of techniques and we wrote in role as Varjak Paw. We were inspired by the author, David Fuller, who visited us on Monday, to pay particular care and attention to the editing process. In Maths, we have focused on written methods of multiplication. In Art, we started to design cityscapes based on the setting on our book. In RSHE, we discussed the positive attributes needed to be a good friend. In Computing, we can now explain the types of media that can be shared on the world wide web. In Science, we described how sound waves are made and how they come from a sound source.
North America (Year 5)	It's been an exciting week in North America! On Monday, we welcomed author David Fuller, who talked engagingly about becoming and being an author and some of the most important skills he needs (including lots of checking!) In woodland learning, the children showed lots of creativity in the activities they completed – Mrs Davies was definitely impressed. The same is true of Mrs Thompson, as the class showed excellent focus in gymnastics this week. The progress from week to week is impressive! In science, we have been thinking about how to investigate the effects of air resistance and, in history, we have researched the lives of prominent figures from the Industrial Revolution. We are finding out more about biographies and how to write them in English, and in maths, we are learning about balancing multiplicative equations. Finally, well done to all who took part in the tag rugby tournament at The Weald this week. The competition was pretty stiff but the team never gave up.

South America (Year 6)	It's been a very cold but good week in South America. We were very lucky to have a visit from author David Fuller this week who shared his books with the children and his road to becoming an author. He was very entertaining and the children enjoyed hearing his story. We have been learning about area and perimeter in maths and the children have been challenging themselves by looking at compound shapes and applying their knowledge to a range of problems. In English, we have continued to read our book and have met the beetle called Baxter and we have started to look at our next piece of writing, which will be persuasion. In PE we have been honing our skipping skills and continued to explore shapes in gymnastics. The children enjoyed starting our new science topic all about living things. We looked at animals this week and how Carl Linnaeus developed the system for classification. The children have worked really hard this week, have a restful weekend.
