| Poor standard of hand hygiene  - Personnel becoming infected due to poor standards of hand hygiene of others   | All adults and<br>children | Frequent and thorough hand cleaning should be regular practice. Ensure that staff and pupils can clean their hands regularly with soap and water or hand sanitiser (recommended 70% alcohol).  Display instructive posters.  | classrooms. Hand sanitiser and hand washing facilities in each classroom. Foot pedal bins to be used in each classroom to avoid hands being used on bins. All staff and pupils will be reminded of the expectations at the start of term and regularly thereafter. Display instructive posters. Promote the importance of staff and pupils carrying tissues with them. Have spare tissues available. Provide bins for the disposal of soiled tissues. Encourage good hand hygiene. Ensure bins are regularly emptied / disposed.   | Tissues are freely available and plentiful in every classroom so children are not expected to carry their own. Bins are emptied daily. | Lack of Personal Protective Equipment (PPE) - Personnel exposed to infection - Required if a pupil has routine intimate care that requires staff to use PPE and if a pupil displays COVID-19 symptoms and close contact is required and when performing aerosol generating procedures (AGPs) | All adults and<br>children | Keep a supply of PPE for occasions where it is required. Including: - Disposable gloves. Disposable plastic apron. Fluid repellent surgical mask. Eye protection - where there is risk of eye contamination from respiratory droplets or from splashing of secretions. Additionally for AGPs: - Long-sleeved disposable fluid repellent gown. FFP3 Respirator. Provide face fit testing for FFP3 masks (usually undertaken annually over summer or very early autumn to ensure completed before winter). | PPE equipment pack to be available in each classroom for use in emergency as well as in central places such as the community room. An unlimited supply of PPE equipment is available in the business manager's office and an ongoing schedule for ordering PPE is in place to ensure constant supply. Staff are no longer required to wear face masks, however it will remain optional. | Poor cleaning regimes –<br>Personnel exposed to infection<br>from transferring contamination<br>on touched surfaces to<br>nose/mouth                             | All staff and pupils | Arrange a regular cleaning schedule (e.g. twice per day) of frequently touched surfaces (i.e. surfaces which are touched by several people, e.g. door handles). Arrange/enable cleaning of shared equipment.   | Hygiene checklist to be adhered to in each classroom. Business manager will be working alongside MMS to co-ordinate cleaning routines at lunchtime. See separate risk assessment for external clubs e.g. Kiwi club / breakfast club etc. Business manager to liaise with external cleaning company to communicate daily cleaning expectations.  | All staff and external cleaning company. | 04/04/2022 | Click or tap to<br>enter a date. |

| Poorly ventilated occupied indoor spaces – Increased risk of infection via higher concentration of contaminated droplets in the air                              | All staff and pupils | Identify poorly ventilated occupied indoor spaces. Take steps to improve fresh air supply to those spaces. Minimise occupant numbers who are using hard to ventilate spaces. Purge spaces when they are unoccupied. If using Co2 detectors to measure fresh air supply rate, refer to the levels given in the HSE and CIBSE guidance and seek the advice of a building services engineer on what type of Co2 detector to use and how to use one. If Co2 levels remain above the HSE and CIBSE advisory levels in an occupied indoor space, consider: -  Maximising window and non-fire door opening; Reducing occupancy numbers in affected spaces; Reducing occupancy time in affected spaces; Reducing occupancy time in affected spaces; Using air cleaning and filtration units (see HSE and CIBSE guides and seek the advice of a building services engineer). Balance the need for increased ventilation while maintaining a comfortable temperature. Note: Maintenance of either ventilation or temperature levels must not be by the practice of propping open fire doors unless those fire doors are fitted with hold-back devices which are directly linked to and released by the building's fire alarm system. | Upon receiving CO2 monitors, concentration of CO2 and quality of ventilation will be monitored regularly. Premises officer to open windows in communal areas e.g. hall and staff room. Encourage all staff to have windows and doors open when possible to aid ventilation (windows and doors can be ajar and still provide required ventilation – whilst maintaining a minimum of 18 degrees for thermal comfort). Internal doors to be open at all times. Encourage outside learning wherever possible. Numbers in clubs will be limited and ventilation/hand hygiene etc will continue to be promoted. Phone call home will be made if a child displays symptoms and needs to leave the premises. |  |                         | Have arrangements for anyone in the school who develops C19 symptoms to be sent home (avoiding public transport) and told to follow <u>public health advice</u> .  Have arrangements in place to isolate a C19 symptomatic person while awaiting collection (consider ventilation and PPE if this person cannot be left alone and room cleaning after they have left). Brief and remind staff and pupils that, if anyone in their household is a possible or confirmed C19 positive, that they <u>should not attend school</u> . | cleaned according to the guidance. In line with government guidance, close contacts of a positive case no longer need to self-isolate. It is now ADVISED that people who test positive try to stay at home for 5 full days until they feel better and they no longer have a temperature (if they had one), at which point they can return to school. Any close contact (household member) of someone with confirmed Coxid can continue to attend the school and do not need to take a daily LFD test. It is not recommended that children are tested for Coxid-19 unless directed by a health professional. If a child or young person has a positive test they should try to stay at home and avoid contact with others for 3 full days after the day they took the test. After 3 days if they feel well and do not have a high temperature they can return to school. |                                  |            |                                  |
| Asymptomatic testing –<br>Personnel exposed to increased<br>risk of infection from<br>symptomatic/positive person  | All staff               | Brief and remind staff and pupils to continue twice weekly home testing up until the end of September 2021.  Secondary schools only - Retain a small asymptomatic testing site (ATS) on-site until further notice so they can offer testing to pupils who are unable to test themselves at home.  Secondary schools only - Ensure arrangements are in place to test year 7 pupils at the ATS at the start of the autumn term.  | Following the Governments updated guidance and<br>'Living with Covid' document, staff are not<br>required to take twice weekly LFD tests. Staff are<br>encouraged, wherever possible, to take a LFD test<br>if they feel they are displaying symptoms of Covid-<br>19 or if they are self-isolating and wish to carry<br>out further tests. However, if LFD tests are<br>unavailable staff cannot be expected to test. | Clinically Extremely Vulnerable (CEV on Shielded Patient List) attending school – CEV pupils at increased risk of a poor outcome if exposed to infection  See Govt. quidance | CEV pupils and staff    | Remind CEV pupils that they should attend their education setting unless they are under paediatric or other specialist care who have been advised by their GP or clinician not to attend (see supporting pupils at school with medical conditions). Staff members who are in the CEV category may return to school but school leaders should take account of this in their Staff / Volunteer Assessment (see previous assessment page).  | Individual risk assessments will be carried out for all staff members, including CEV members of staff.  | SLT                              | 01/09/2021 | Click or tap to enter a date.    |
| Contractors and others visiting the school – Contractors and other visitors not adhering to the school's C19 measures and risking cross- infection                           | All staff and<br>pupils | Provide contractors and other visitors with information about the school's C19 control measures and ways of working.   | Visitors will be directed to the website / risk assessment. Upon arrival, visitors will be asked about any symptoms they may have. Ensure meeting spaces are well-ventilated wherever possible. During any internal meetings, social distancing will be encouraged. Although face coverings are no longer mandatory, these will be available if required. | Face coverings - Personnel exposed to increased risk of infection from symptomatic / positive person  | Click or tap<br>here to enter<br>text. | Currently, there is no national requirement for pupils, staff and visitors either in classrooms or in communal areas to wear face masks. However, Director of Public Health has advised that head teachers may wish to consider their continuing use in specific circumstances, e.g. in response to cases; this includes public transport and dedicated transport to school.
