

We have been learning

Africa	In our final week of the half-term we have been discovering the baby names
(Year R)	of many different animals. We were surprised to hear that rabbits and cats both have kittens. We were really excited to find a tree full of small ermine moth caterpillars; they had covered the tree with silk webs. In French we made our own Monsieur Potato with actual potatoes and in Woodland Learning we were treated to smores and hot chocolate. In Maths this week we have been learning how to compose and de-compose shapes (triangles, squares and rectangles) and how to complete tangrams (shape based puzzles).

Asia (Year 1)	What a great last week of the half term it's been but where has the time gone?! We have been continuing to write our Percy stories, continuing the process of drafting, editing and then publishing. In maths we have been exploring numbers to 100, ordering and partitioning them as well as finding missing numbers in a sequence. In Geography we have mastered identifying all 7 continents and 5 oceans on a world map and can locate them independently! In Computing we are continuing to create our posters, using our keyboard skills.
Europe (Year 2)	We have had such a brilliant week in year 2, firstly with our trip to the Sealife Centre and then pirate day. The children were a credit to you all and learnt so much about the different habitats the creatures live in and the superpowers they have to help them survive. The children looked amazing on pirate day and enjoyed finding hidden mathematical clues in the woods to earn themselves treasure. They also learnt about pirates from the past, including Blackbeard who drank grog mixed with gunpowder. In art we have completed our mixed media pictures in the style of Patricia Greaves using fabric and wax resist to create a seaside scene.
Australasia (Year 3)	We have worked hard in our final week before half term! The children have done some lovely writing about The Last Bear. We have also been looking at fractions again and some of the children have been really pleased to see they understood more than they thought they did! The children were sad to have their last session with coach Ben for cricket; he said how pleased he was with the progress they had made. We have also finished our tennis sessions and are looking forward to athletics after half term. Our topic on Anglo-Saxons continues after half-term and we are really excited about visiting Butser Farm just after half-term. It should be a great day!
Antarctica (Year 4)	It has been another busy week in Year 4 as we approach half term. In English, we have enjoyed finding out about the country of Brazil which is linked to our Explorer book. They have worked hard in creating in an information leaflet for visitor. In maths, we have focused on rounding decimals to whole numbers. In Geography, we created a weather report for the Amazon rainforest to show our understanding of the climate and in RE we discussed the important value of forgiveness. In PE we started a unit of work on improving our athletic techniques. In Science, we have continued to learning about electrical circuits. We had our final Woodland Learning session of the term and enjoyed den building and eating smores with hot chocolate,
North America (Year 5)	What a fantastic final week before half term – a busy one as usual. We completed our first draft of our narrative extension of Podkin One Ear. The children have thought carefully about how to introduce their problems and how their characters overcome them. In maths, the children have recapped on how to round whole numbers and extended to round to the nearest tenth. In history, we explored how the introduction of the television changes people's lives and on the final day, we spent the morning cooking our soups, putting our recipes to the test. The children have loved the process of researching recipes, learning how to chop using a knife safely and most importantly, the tasting session. Have a great half term all – see you shortly!
South America (Year 6)	That's another half term complete! This week in maths we have been learning about scale factor and designed our ideal bedrooms by creating a scaled drawing. In English, we have worked hard to finish our short stories and they are amazing. We also finished reading Coraline and watched the film to be able to see the differences between the two. In PE, we played kickball rounders with the focus being team tactics and in history we learnt about mummification and the process that was followed by the ancient Egyptians. In science, we finished

our microbes topic by taking part in yeast races. This was an experiment to see the ideal environment for yeast to grow, we then wrote scientific conclusions about our observations. Have a wonderful half term everyone ©
