We have been learning

Africa (Year R)	This week we have been thinking about the signs of Spring and taking a closer look at flowers that grow from bulbs. We have used watercolours to paint representations of tulips, daffodils and grape hyacinths. We discovered that there are many famous artists who enjoyed painting flowers, such as Van Gogh and Monet. In Maths we have been
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	<p>comparing numbers and using language such as: most, least, same. In Woodland Learning this week we made bird feeders from pinecones, which we really enjoyed doing as it was very messy! In French we revisited the story of The Three Little Pigs, which was wonderful to hear in a different language. We have also been very musical this week. We have all been learning how to play the G note on the glockenspiel and some of us have even made our own drumming band! What another lovely week of learning we have had in Africa class.</p>
Asia (Year 1)	<p>Another super week in Asia class! The children have been working their socks off this week! We had a super PE session on Monday learning different basket-ball skills and applying them in different game situations. The children were extremely focused and even persevered through the giant gusts of wind that kept making our cones run away! In history this week we revisited our knowledge of Mary Anning and thought about how she had impacted the world we know today, the children used this knowledge and created posters to show their understanding and they were amazing. In maths we have been ordering numbers to 50 using our knowledge of tens and ones to help us! In literacy we have been writing super sentences about how we would like our key text Tyrannosaurus Drip to end, they all had such fantastic ideas! We have been continuing to develop our understanding of colour in art, learning how to make colours darker to create different shades! Well done Asia class, you have been such hard workers!</p>
Europe (Year 2)	<p>This week we finished our core text 'The Curious Garden' and enjoyed writing a short narrative to predict what might come next and using adjectives to write a description. In maths, our learning has focused on 2D and 3D shapes, learning about sides, vertices, faces and lines of symmetry. In science, we looked back at our own plants and discussed what they have needed to stay healthy. In music, we are getting so good on the ukulele and playing the 'C' and 'Am' chords. In RSHE, we discussed what 'belonging' means and where we might belong in our lives. In gymnastics, we are gaining so much confidence and becoming great performers!</p>
Australasia (Year 3)	<p>This week we have been planning our play scripts for the story of Iliona the Roman slave, adding an extra scene to the story. We role-played our ideas with our peers before recording our plans. In maths we have been brushing up on our knowledge of unit and non-unit fractions, identifying the numerator and denominator. On Tuesday we enjoyed our penultimate swimming lessons and learnt about how to read flags at the beach to know whether it's safe to swim. As part of geography and history we have been learning all about how the Romans built their roads and where these were located in Britain. We plotted these roads a map of the UK, locating the towns and cities they passed through.</p>
Antarctica (Year 4)	<p>We have been busy researching Henry VIII's character and reign this week in order to create a non-chronological report. We chose suitable subheadings to organise the information we gathered and some of us included a 'Did You Know?' box to highlight some lesser known facts about him which we had discovered. In Maths we have continued our focus on measurement and have been converting between units of time, kilograms and grams, and calculating the perimeter of shapes. We began to explore the Easter Story in RE and sequenced the different events.</p>

North America (Year 5)	North America class have really worked hard this week despite having various adults in to the support them so well done to all. In maths the children continued to convert measurements linked to length, mass and capacity as well as continued practice of multiplying and diving by 10, 100 and 1,000. In English, the children have continued to write and edit their information page on the Vikings and getting ready to publish them next week.
South America (Year 6)	This week we have been learning about fractions, decimals and percentages and finding equivalences between them and then applying this knowledge to find percentages of amounts. In English, we have started our text, 'The Land of Neverbelieve'. We have been predicting what the island is like and reading the different the pages for each different plate. In science, we have been learning about adaptation and planning an investigation into birds beaks and how they are suited to the food they eat. We have also been looking at biomes in geography and learned all about the tundra and in computing we have continued learning about spreadsheets.
